Brian Avery. International Solidarity Movement peace activist who was shot in the face by Israeli army personnel in the West Bank city of Jenin.

Mubarak Awad. Founder of Nonviolence International, The Center for the Study of Non-Violence in Palestine, and The National Youth Advocate Program.

Mohammed Bamyeh. Hubert Humphrey Visiting Professor of Islamic Studies, Department of International Studies, Macalester College, St. Paul, MN

Jesse Benjamin. Israeli/US/Canadian and anti-Zionist Jew, social justice activist, & Asst. Professor of Human Relations & Multicultural Education, St. Cloud State Univ.

Phyllis Bennis. A fellow of the Institute for Policy Studies in Washington, focusing on Middle East and United Nations issues. She has written widely on Palestine, Iraq, and U.S. domination of the UN, including recent primers on Palestine and Iraq. Currently she co-chairs the U.S. Campaign to End the Israeli Occupation.

Craig and Cindy Corrie. Parents of Rachel Corrie, an International Solidarity Movement peace activist, killed by a military bulldozer in Rafah, Gaza, March 2003.

Don Christensen. Retired United Church of Christ pastor who did “wall watching” in the Jayyous area in the northern West Bank.

Jonathan Kuttab. A leading Palestinian human rights lawyer from Jerusalem and a member of the Israeli, Palestinian, and New York bar associations; co-founder of the Palestinian Center for the Study of Nonviolence, International Commission of Jurists (West Bank affiliate), Al-Haq, and the Mandela Institute for Political Prisoners.

Corrine Patton. Associate Professor Theology at the University of St. Thomas. She has a Ph.D in Hebrew Bible, Old Testament, from Yale University.

Flo Razowsky. Jewish-American who served as member and coordinator for the International Solidarity Movement in Palestine and was forcibly expelled from Israel.

Lynne Rigg. Retired Evangelical Lutheran Church in America pastor who did accompaniment in Ramallah in connection with Hope Lutheran School.

Josh Ruebner. Co-founder of Jews for Peace in Palestine and Israel, former analyst in Middle East Affairs at the Congressional Research Service, and Grassroots Advocacy Coordinator for the U.S. Campaign to End Israeli Occupation.

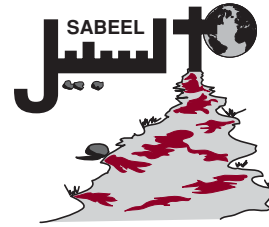

PAX CHRISTI USA



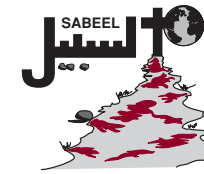
